#### The Big Idea

Loving God fully then loving people equally sum up God's whole purpose for each person

Juggling

We spend our lives juggling many things

So many demands and things of 'greatest' importance

Jesus said: Exactly 2 things matter most

Love God fully

Love people equally

Everything else must fit in these 2



## Core Value: Wholeness of Humanity Given to God

We believe that the Gospel addresses the whole person, including **head** (that is, knowledge and ever deepening theology), **heart** (that is, rich fellowship with God and people), and **hands** (that is, love for God and people put into action).

- We walk in the tension of perfect justice and rich mercy
- We seek to live for the good of people beyond ourselves
- We work to build relationships and interactions beyond Sunday morning

- Is it loving people as ourselves?
