1 Peter 1:1-12

When life is challenging...

~~If we do it right and God is good,
the Christian life should be a lot like heaven~~
"Grace and peace be yours in abundance." 1 Peter 1:2

1-2: God controls the heavens

3-5: God Almighty is guarding us and our incredible, glorious **inheritance**

6-9: We currently have troubles that are bringing us **greater glory than gold**

10-12: Trouble then glory...like the prophets and Jesus!



The Big Idea

For all who have put their faith in Christ
**God is using even our troubles
to add to the wonders
of our unending joy with Him in glory**



Maybe we think...

like a spare time, faith in Christ through troubles is something we hope we never have to use
if we live well and pray well,
faith through troubles will be an unused backup plan

Rather

The joy of the Christian journey is the hope of the destination



Application

Rejoice in the glorious inheritance guaranteed by God Almighty

Jesus: "For the joy set before him he endured the cross" Hebrews 12:2

The best of this life wildly magnified, without any of the sorrow or wrong or decay or...

Recognize trials as God's means to prove and build our faith

→ increasing the glory to come

"The bombs bursting in air gave proof..."
